“If a person is convinced there is no God when actually there is one, he is merely mistaken. But this is never the case according to Paul’s explanation of Psalm 14 in Romans 1-3. The reason the person is a fool and not merely mistaken is that he knows there is a God and yet chooses to believe and act as if there is none...It is not possible for a person to move himself from saying Psalm 14:1 to saying 14:7, God must act upon us in Jesus Christ. In the first chapter of 1 Corinthians the apostle Paul is talking about wisdom. He is contrasting the true wisdom of the gospel with the apparent wisdom of the wise, who regard the gospel as foolishness. God has destroyed this human wisdom, he says. And he has given us Jesus, “who has become for us wisdom from God—that is, our righteousness, holiness, and redemption” (1 Cor. 1 :30). That is it exactly! Left to ourselves, our minds run to utter foolishness, and we act the fool too. But in Christ we find wisdom from God which is able to save us and lead us in the way of righteousness.”

Review Questions:

Confession of Faith

The Belgic Confession (1561) Article 23

Minister: Christians, what do you believe about justification?

People: We believe that our salvation consists in the remission of our sins for Jesus Christ's sake, and that therein our righteousness before God is implied: as David and Paul teach us, declaring this to be the happiness of man, that God imputes righteousness to him without works. And the same apostle says, that we are justified freely by his grace, through the redemption which is in Jesus Christ. And therefore we always hold fast this foundation, ascribing all the glory to God, humbling ourselves before him, and acknowledging ourselves to be such as we really are, without presuming to trust in anything in ourselves, or in any merit of ours, relying and resting upon the obedience of Christ crucified alone, which becomes ours, when we believe in him. This is sufficient to cover all our iniquities, and to give us confidence in approving to God; freeing the conscience of fear, terror and dread, without following the example of our first father, Adam, who, trembling, attempted to cover himself with fig-leaves. And verily if we should appear before God, relying on ourselves, or on any other creature, though ever so little, we should, alas! be consumed. And therefore everyone must pray with David: O Lord, enter not into judgment with thy servant: for in thy sight shall no man living be justified.

¹⁸ In hope he believed against hope, that he should become the father of many nations, as he had been told, "So shall your offspring be."¹

¹⁹ He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was as good as dead (since he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. ²⁰ No unbelief made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, ²¹ fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised.²² That is why his faith was "counted to him as righteousness."²³

²³ But the words "it was counted to him" were not written for his sake alone, ²⁴ but for ours also. It will be counted to us who believe in him who raised from the dead Jesus our Lord, ²⁵ who was delivered up for our trespasses and raised for our justification.

Leader: This is the Word of the Lord.

People: Thanks be to God!

Abraham was saved not by works but through faith alone. It's called saving faith and is the instrument whereby God declares his people righteous and forgiven of their sins- justified.

We'll see three points on saving faith in the text:

- I. Saving faith trusts God's word, not our sight. V18
- II. Saving faith can grow stronger resulting in worship as we consider our weakness, V19-21
- III. Saving faith's only object must be the risen Jesus. V23-25
